Hiker Responsibility Code

With knowledge and gear. Become selfreliant by learning about the terrain, conditions, local weather and your equipment before you start.

To leave your plans. Tell someone where you are going, the trails you are hiking, when you'll return and your emergency plans.

To stay together. When you start as a group, hike as a group, end as a group. Pace your hike to the slowest person.

To turn back. Weather changes quickly in the mountains. Fatigue and unexpected conditions can also affect your hike. Know your limitations and when to postpone your hike. The mountains will be there another day.

For emergencies. Even if you are headed out for just an hour, an injury, severe weather or a wrong turn could become life threatening. Don't assume you will be rescued; know how to rescue yourself.

To share the hiker code with others.

Town Forest. It also reviews wetland permits and organizes the annual roadside clean up. For more information email bethlehemnhconservation@gmail.com.





Hiking Trail

Trails are within the White Mountain National Forest.

Trailhead is on Zealand Road in Carroll, NH (summits are in Bethlehem). Zealand Road leaves the west side of Rt. 302, which is 2.2 miles east of Rt. 3. Parking is one mile down, on the right.

Mountain Biking Trails

Trails are on public and private lands, in partnership with BTA.

Downtown Trail: A 3-mile trail winding through downtown Bethlehem. Access these trails from Elm St.

Trudeau Road Loop: Thanks to support from the White Mountain National Forest. BTA has cleared a double track loop off of Trudeau Road.



Hiking Trails

Directions: From Interstate-93 take exit 40, Route 302 East for .5 miles. Turn right after the Rocks sign. Maps are available at the information kiosk.

Directions: The Town Forest can be accessed off Prospect Street, about 1 mile from Rt. 302 on the right. The forest is open to the public and non-motorized vehicles. (Hunting is prohibited).
